The American Society of Accreditation of Security Professionals (AsAsP), LLC is the first company to establish a baseline training criteria for security professionals that offer a methodology for achieving a national training standard for professionalizing the security practitioner, and recognized as the only national organization providing this type of service.

Why AsAsP?

- No established training standard for security professionals.
- No national organization to establish standards or quality of service provided by security professionals.
- No national criteria for becoming a security professional—is security a profession? How do you become a security professional in the different specialty areas?
- No current method to professionalize the security practitioner without ASASP.

Individual Certification Program (ICP)

Organizational Accreditation/Certification Program (OCP)

Inspections and Assessments Program (IAP)

Consultant Services (CSP)

Individual Certification Requirements (ICP)

The AsAsP individual certification program objectives are achieved by an aggressive certification program that verifies compliance with established baseline training requirements and state laws. Although certification is designed or centered around validation achievement of baseline standards and state laws, other factors such as, work history in performance of security duties and conduct off duty (law abiding citizen) could be considered in the validation process. The minimum requirements to obtain and maintain AsAsP certification are outlined below:

AsAsP Certification Criteria (The following standards are a prerequisite for qualifications—work history, acquired experience or education):

- Currently working as a security professional.
- Currently working as a police officer.

- Completed a criminal justice degree program or security based training program that has over 30 semester hours in security or police operations.
- Former security professional with satisfactory work history.

Training Qualifications (The following training requirements identified in the chart below are mandatory to obtain and maintain certification):

- 30 credit hours for armed security professional (Initial Training)
- 24 credit hours for un-armed security professional (Initial Training)
- 18 credit hours for armed security professional (Annual Training)
- 12 credit hours for un-armed security professional (Annual Training)

Organizational Accreditation Requirements (OCP)

The AsAsP organizational accreditation/certification program objectives are accomplished by detailed assessment of security work history, performance, management principles, and business practices as established by state and federal statutes. The minimum requirements to obtain and maintain ASASP certification are outlined below:

- Serves a security based company providing security services or products.
- Complies with employment laws and regulations.
- Maintains over 90% compliance with training laws governing services and products provided to their customer.
- Maintains a workforce that has a 95% satisfactory background checks.

Consultant Services (CSP)

AsAsP consultant service is designed to provide businesses an objective viewpoint of security services provided by security companies across the full security spectrum. Additionally, the intent of this service is to ensure that customer’s assets are afforded maximum protection, through detailed examination of current countermeasures employed to reduce risk. Although these services provide an analysis of services provided by security companies, it is not related or affiliated with the ASASP organizational accreditation/certification program—it is pure business/customer protection service.

Inspection and Assessment Program (IAP)

The AsAsP inspection and assessment program is a service providing detailed security inspections, surveys/assessments, and risk management reviews of companies, organizations, facilities, installations, and compounds using industry proven standards and procedures.
